- Plagiarism is using someone’s work or ideas without giving credit. See *MLA Handbook* for specific guidelines to avoid plagiarism.
- Sections and some examples on this handout have *Rules for Writers* and *MLA Handbook 9th Edition* page numbers to point you to more information and examples, e.g. [RW 493] [MLA 303]. Don’t include them in your Works Cited page.
- This guide single spaces citations to conserve space. **Remember to double space your Works Cited!**

For sources located online - DOIs/Permalinks/URLs:

- **Order of preference for web addresses is: 1. DOI, 2. Permalink, or 3. URL** (MLA 188).
- **DOI** – Stands for Digital Object Identifier and is a “string of numbers and letters that typically begins with the number 10. If the DOI is not preceded by http:// or https:// in your source, precede the DOI in your entry with the following: https://doi.org/” (MLA 194).
- **Permalinks** – There are stable links for entries in the library catalog and databases; the links can usually be found in the “tools” or “share” section of the article record in library databases.
- **URLs** – When using, copy full URL from browser. You can omit *http://* or *https://* from URLs (but include *https://* with DOIs) and can shorten URL’s that are longer than 3 lines but keep at least the host or main site part of URL (MLA 195-196).

Books

[RW 429-434] [MLA 313-319]

Basic Format – Book

Author. *Title of the Book*. Publisher, year of publication.

Notes on publishers: [RW 419] [MLA 172]

- Omit words such as Inc. and Co.
- Keep words such as Books and Press
- For university publishers, use U and P for the words University and Press, such as: Yale UP

Book with one author:

Coates, Ta-Nehisi. *Between the World and Me*. Spiegel and Grau, 2015.

Books with two authors:

Conklin, Christina, and Marina Psaros. *The Atlas of Disappearing Places: Our Coasts and Oceans in the Climate Crisis*. New Press, 2021.

Book with three or more authors:

Blaine, John, et al. *The Secret of Success*. Gale, 2008.

Note: All works cited entries follow the same format for one, two, or three or more authors.

Book with an editor:

Stotts, Taneka, editor. *Elements: Fire: An Anthology by Creators of Color*. Beyond Press, 2017.

Signed (authored) chapter in edited book, anthology, or article in reference book (e.g. encyclopedia):

DeNardis, Laura. “Internet Points of Control as Global Governance.” *Organized Chaos: Reimagining the Internet*, edited by Mark Raymond and Gordon Smith, Center for International Governance Innovation, 2014, pp. 31-46.

Unsigned (Anonymous) article in an encyclopedia or dictionary:

“Reckon.” *Merriam-Webster’s Collegiate Dictionary*, 10th ed., Merriam-Webster, 2002, p. 973

E-Book edition [RW 429] [MLA 316]

Jemisin, N. K. *The Fifth Season*. E-book ed., Orbit, 2015.

E-Book in a database [RW 431] [MLA 316]

Basic Format

Author. “Article Title.” *Publication Title*, volume, issue number, date, page numbers.

Note: If the source (such as some magazines or newspapers) does not have volume or issue numbers, you would just leave them out of the citation

Article from print periodical with one author

Article from periodical with a season in the date

Electronic Periodicals - Journals, Magazines, Newspapers

[RW 424-429] [MLA 325-326, 158-164]

Basic Format (Notes on DOIs, Permalinks, and URLs on the top of p. 1 of this guide!)

Author. “Article Title.” *Publication Title*, volume, issue number, date, page numbers. *Name of Database*, DOI/Permalink/URL.

Basic Format

Author. "Title of Work." *Title of Site*, publisher or sponsor of site, date of publication or update, URL.

Notes:

- **Publisher or sponsor of site only needed if different from title of site**
- **Include accessed date if there is no publication or update date, or you suspect the work has been altered or removed.** [MLA 211]

Basic Format

Account Name [@handle]. “First line of post as written, stylized, and capitalized.” *Title of Site*, date, URL.

- Notes:**
- If account name is a person’s full name use format: Last, First
 - You can omit handle if it is similar to account name [MLA 118]

Tweet
